MD, IBCLC, FRNZCGP

Rona Carroll is a mother of 3 children and a GP with a special interest in breastfeeding support, perinatal mental health and youth health. She is also an IBCLC and La Leche League Leader. Rona has worked in the CCDHB specialist maternal mental health team, and completed a postgraduate diploma in perinatal mental health. She sits on the board of PADA (Perinatal Anxiety and Depression Aotearoa) and the Newtown Breastfeeding Support Centre. Rona works with young parents at a Youth One Stop Shop and also works as a medical sexual assault clinician in Wellington.



Dr Yvonne LeFort

MD, FCFP, FRNZCGP, FABM, IBCLC

Dr Yvonne LeFort is a Canadian trained family physician based in Auckland, New Zealand. She is a Fellow of the Academy of Breastfeeding Medicine and member of the Board of Directors. She has been active in breastfeeding education for physicians and allied health care professionals. She initiated a Breastfeeding Peer Review Group for members of the Royal New Zealand College of GPs who meet regularly through an online platform. Her involvement in helping breastfeeding mothers and babies stretches over 20 years. Her specific interests include breastfeeding pain, the use of medications while breastfeeding, the management of tongue tie. Dr LeFort has established a private Breastfeeding Clinic in Milford on Auckland's North Shore, working closely with an IBCLC to provide comprehensive lactation care for mothers and their infants.



Dr Alexia Chisholm

MBChB, DCH, IBCLC

Alexia Chisholm is a La Leche Leader, IBCLC and GP. She trained in New Zealand and recently returned from Australia where she was working in Women's Health and in General Practice setting, with a large number of Breastfeeding Medicine consultations. Alexia has two school aged children and works in Christchurch.



Kelly Dorgan

RM, DM

Kelly is a registered midwife who is currently working as a Breastfeeding Health Promoter for Te Puawaitanga Ki Ōtautahi Trust. During her 15 years of community midwifery, Kelly held a number of auxiliary roles including chair of the Canterbury/West Coast Region of the New Zealand College of Midwives and LMC Liaison for the CDHB. She has studied herbal medicine and has been studying Te Reo and Tikanga Māori both formally and informally for the last 10 years.



Carol Bartle

RN, RM, IBCLC, PGDip Child Advocacy, MHealSc (Otago)

Carol Bartle has a nursing, midwifery and lactation consultant background. She has a post-graduate diploma in Child Advocacy and a Masters of Health Sciences from the University of Otago. Her qualitative research thesis explores mothers' experiences of initiating lactation and establishing breastfeeding in a neonatal intensive care environment. Major interests include ethics, NICU infant feeding issues and mother-baby well-being, infant feeding in emergencies, climate change and health, the International Code, breastfeeding and infant feeding politics, mother-to-mother peer counselling, and mothers and babies in prison. Carol worked with the Canterbury Breastfeeding Advocacy Service in Christchurch New Zealand, and is a policy analyst with the New Zealand College of Midwives.



Dr Bronwyn Dixon MBChB, FRACP, DCH & Dr Juliet Gray BDS, MSc, FDS RCS Edin

Bronwyn Dixon is a Neonatal Paediatrician from the Christchurch Neonatal Unit. She has an interest in infant feeding and teaching and has been clinical lead of the Tongue Tie Project in Christchurch over the last 3 years. Juliet Gray is a special care dentist at Christchurch Hospital and also works as a clinical facilitator for the Canterbury Health initiative. She enjoys providing oral health care for people with complex medical problems and living with disabilities. Together Bronwyn and Juliet have led a multidisciplinary community and hospital team to focus on evidence based treatment for ankyloglossia in Canterbury, New Zealand.
